MESSAGE FROM JOSEPH

Another Christmas season has come. While remaining thankful to God for the birth of the unique Saviour, it is profitable to learn lessons for our life from the significant Christmas story. It is unfortunate that Christmas messages have become substandard, dry and dull these days, because the focus is lost.

There is a wrong slant in observing Christmas and perverted goals in the allied programmes. Merry making has taken up the centre stage, pushing aside all the values and virtues involved in the great event. The memorable lessons of the greatest historic event and the significant qualities of the key persons involved are not carefully studied and understood. The Christian community and the writers in particular, should come back to the original in order to celebrate Christmas in a God pleasing and heaven honouring manner.

Joseph, the husband of Mary, fulfilled his role in a remarkable way with perseverance. But he is often forgotten by the Christian community. A careful study of this noble character brings out several valuable lessons to appreciate and follow.

Shined as a Righteous Man

A Man can accomplish more through his character, than through his physical and intellectual abilities. "If wealth is lost, nothing is lost, if health is lost, something is lost; but if character is lost, everything is lost!"—goes a proverb. Effective ministry flows out of a good character. God's scale of evaluation is totally different from that of man. "Man looks at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart" (1 Sam 16:7).

The Bible scales Joseph as a just and righteous man (Mt 1:19). Holy living has become rare in the modern world. People look for personality, status, outward show and verbal wisdom. For God, inner life is more important than any thing else. Righteous living in a corrupt world makes Christians different. The crowning virtue of Joseph can be stated as

purity and integrity. Wanted—Men and Women of righteous living, in Word, Thought and Deed. Yes, Christmas is the occasion to search our hearts and take positive steps to lead a life of holiness at any cost.

Submitted to God's will

Mary was the prospective young woman of his heart to whom he was betrothed, and looking ahead for the day of marriage. After learning that Mary was with a child before marriage, Joseph wanted to put her away quietly, but an angel of God assured him in a dream that the child to be born was conceived by the Holy Spirit and immediately he accepted her as his wife in total submission to God's will (Mt 1:18-25). Neither did he question God nor did he act rashly with his espoused, although he was baffled by her condition. This serves as an example for Godly wisdom, in accepting God's will in crucial decision making moments. As a praying man, he waited upon God and received God's revelation distinctly. In accepting Mary, in going to Bethlehem and then in moving to Egypt for safety—Joseph submitted himself to God's perfect plan. God never fails them who surrender to Him unconditionally. Yes, Christmas is an opportunity to search our ways and to submit to God's will.

Strengthened Relationships

Joseph took up his family responsibility and played his role actively. He proved himself to be a kind, polite and gentle husband to Mary (Mt 1:19; Lk 2:1-7). He stood with her amidst stress and strain; He was willing to accept the reproach of the society for the sake of his God-given family. He cared for his dear wife tenderly as if the child she was bearing was his own. He took them to Bethlehem for census, when the emperor Augustus decreed so. He was present at the manger, when the shepherds came to see the baby Jesus, unmindful of the indifferent behaviour of the innkeeper. In order to fulfill the priestly responsibility of the father, he took baby Jesus to the temple as a pious Jew. He fulfilled all the ordinances

of the Temple, as a responsible head of the family. He went in search of the missing boy Jesus at the age of 12, when he stayed back in the Temple after the festival (Lk 2:22-24, 41,42). He was faithful in the up-bringing of Jesus and deserved to be called His father (Lk 2:33; Jn 1:45; 6:42). The home nurture and the training received by Jesus from the carpentry shop of His father, undoubtedly, built an affectionate and strong bond between Jesus and His earthly parents. Relationships are neither instant nor readymade, but have to be carefully built with constant effort. Yes, Christmas is a time to think of our family relationships and responsibilities and make good of the failures.

Shunned selfish Gains

Self is the pivot around which the natural man revolves. Joseph never wanted to make use of his position given by God to exalt himself. He was not interested in dishonest gains, but determined to remain a carpenter, a man of wood and nails all through his life (Mk 6:3). How many of us, to our shame and disgrace, must confess that many times we have put ourselves and our families in the forefront, misusing our positions. The self-seeking 'self' stands out as the greatest stumbling block against pleasing God.

Joseph was willing to suffer because of his God-given position and face persecution. Warned by the Lord in a dream that Herod was plotting the murder of the Child Jesus, he fled with Mary and Jesus to Egypt (Mt 2:13-19). How much dreadful it would have been to have long journeys in those days of inadequate transport facility! He was willing to take risks and face hardships for the cause of God's kingdom. He never had ulterior motives and hidden agendas. Yes, Christmas is the right time to die for ourselves and our selfish motives and live for others with sacrificial love.

To sum up, Joseph was a role model for lofty ideals and noble character. He was known for righteous living, submission to God's will, strengthening the family ties and for subverting selfishness in his life. Shall we celebrate this Christmas with a commitment to follow his example? f

A YEAR OF HARVEST

(A report by the Field Ministry Coordinator)

With just Rs. 10/- plus God as its investment and with no full time staff, Blessing Youth Mission started its revival cum missionary endeavour in the year 1971, keeping Vellore, Tamil Nadu as its headquarters. Today there are more than 320 dedicated fulltime missionaries serving the Lord of the Harvest through this mission spread out in 14 states of India and pursuing a joint effort in labouring for revival, mobilizing youth and fulfilling the Great Commission. The words of the psalmist, “*Those who sow in tears will reap with songs of joy*” (Psa 126:5,6) was literally experienced during the year 2004-2005 (July 2004 to June 2005). A brief report is presented to praise God for His unfailing love and never ending mercies.

Revival Ministry

BYM continues to be a revival movement as per its original vision. Hence paramount importance is given for the revival of the Christians across the country. Systematic and constant efforts were taken up to set ablaze the revival flames through 90 special revival meetings conducted in various cities. Missionary vision and prayer passion was instilled in 1600 people through the missionary conventions held in Hyderabad and Vijayawada and through missionary challenge programmes in Miraj, Pune and Parottukonam. Since the church is a family of families attempts were taken to build Christian Homes. Family retreat, **Love Joy** was conducted in Katni, Sagar (Madhya Pradesh)) Jamkhandi and Yellapur (Karnataka) which brought blessing to 100 families. Blessing Readers Meet, Partners Meet and Key Persons Meet organized in Vijayawada, Ajmer, Guntur, Jaipur, Bhilai and Jabalpur helped the participants to get spiritual nurture, fellowship and challenge for deeper involvement in the Lord’s work. A team of well wishers and 70 circle coordinators from Tamil Nadu undertook a Needy Land Tour in Rajasthan, Maharastra and Karnataka for field exposure and to strengthen the hands of the missionaries. For the revival of the established churches in various fields, all night prayers were periodically arranged which kindled

the prayer spirit of the participants to pour out their heart and soul in intercession.

Youth Ministry

Ministry among the students is a huge and challenging task. In order to cater to the needs of the urban and rural youth, BYM has been systematically targeting these masses since its inception through concentrated programmes. Ministry among youth blossomed with fragrance during this period. More than 16000 boys and girls were reached by the life transforming message of Jesus, the Revolutionary, through the special evangelistic camps **HALO, AROMA, SOZOs** and other similar programmes. 2608 youngsters made a meaningful commitment to follow Jesus and said ‘No’ to sin and satan. The born again students were regularly followed up by 240 campus cells. They are given indepth Bible teaching and scores of practical tips through the Discipleship Training Programmes. Moreover, probable budding leaders were trained in the Leadership Training programmes. Regular fasting prayers were arranged to enhance the youth to build up an intimate relationship with the Lord. Also to give missionary challenge and burden Summer Missionary Programmes were conducted and interested students were taken to remote villages during Christmas season to help them share the love of Christ. Besides these, career guidance and Biblical counseling were also given to students through ‘Exhortation Meet to Exam Goers.’

Church Planting Ministry

Genuine revival results in explosive evangelism. To evangelise the unreached people groups of our country, our missionaries laboured with zeal and vigour. In order to plant churches among the Ahirwar, Patel, Choudhree, Gotia, Banskar, Thakur, Yadav, Vasava, Mang, Warli, Mahar, Gosavi, Marata, Lingayat, Dhanagar, Vaddar, Mangalakoli, Siddi, Gauli, Banjara, Gonda, Soura, Malayali and Lambadi people groups, missionaries adopted various missiological principles in church planting and followed

definite strategies like web evangelism, power encounter, personal evangelism, fasting prayer, house prayers and pastoral care. Amidst all odds, our missionaries were able to reap a good harvest. 905 souls were liberated and set free from the slavery of sin and 557 people obeyed the Lord in fulfilling His righteousness. The Lord in his mercy enabled our missionaries to establish 49 new congregations and to construct four new church buildings during this period. Spiritual nourishment and motivation for bold witnessing were imparted to the believers through Believers Retreats and 'Festival of Joy' programmes. Active believers were equipped and trained in the Deacons Training Programmes and Ministerial Efficiency programmes. Ministry among the children gained momentum. Biblical values were taught systematically every week to 2947 children through the Sunday school ministry. VBS was conducted in many remote villages.

Literature Ministry

In the process of preparing the people for a heaven sent revival, BYM considers quality devotional Christian literature as one of the helpful and powerful tools. Hence a separate department was launched in Chennai, exclusively to produce and distribute books, cassettes, CDs and VCDs. Blessing Literature Distributors were appointed to speed up the distribution of our publications. A consultation meet on literature was organized in Jabalpur in June 2005 to review and find out ways and means to promote the literature across the country. Our missionaries with Blessing Literature visited thousands of Christian families, Churches, Bible Seminaries and Institutions during this period and a number of Literature Distribution Programmes were organized in different cities to achieve the targets and goals of this ministry. By the blessings of God, all the issues of *Blessing Magazine* in Assamese, English Gujarathi, Hindi, Kannada, Malayalam, Marathi, Oriya, Tamil and Telugu have come out in time during this period under report. God enabled us to release six new books—*Little foxes* and *Don't kill Religion* in Telugu, *Dare to be different* and *Blessed are the obedient* in Malayalam, *12 Happy months* in Gujarathi and *The world of youth* in

Marathi and 4 books and the Tract *Blessing for you* were reprinted in English / Tamil to meet the heavy demand.

Social concerns

Jesus preached and followed up His preaching with social work. His boundless compassion has inspired the BYM to imitate His footsteps. The Blessing School in Sitteri is a real blessing to 160 students. The five Children's Homes that we established in Ramagiri and Umerkote (Orissa), Alnavar (Karnataka), Sitteri Hills (Tamil Nadu) and Katni (Madhya Pradesh) not only take care of the 147 poor children but also give them sound education and teaching on the Holy Scriptures. Also the Day Care Centers in Kuthiranala and Kandrankoppa in Karnataka proved effective where the neglected children are provided help and support. Thanks to the consistent support that we received from the *Indianhilfe* towards the Homes and Day Care Centres. The Feed Orissa project of BYM, started 4 years ago by Dr. Mrs. Lilian Stanley continues to serve the underprivileged people of Orissa. Eye and Dental camps arranged in these areas relieved the pain of hundreds of tribal people. Scores of TB patients are given free treatment, poor people are rehabilitated through useful self employment schemes; destitutes and widows are sheltered and the hungry are fed through this project. Socially neglected people are helped in literacy. Awareness on Aids, Malaria and Leprosy is given through media and counseling.

Staff Training

The Mission took an all out effort to train and equip the missionaries according to their gifts and talents. Training is an investment, which gives great dividends. Four missionaries were sent for a training called 'sharpening your Inter personal skills' organized by MUT and Indian Evangelical Mission. The Family Enrichment Seminar enabled nine missionary couples to strengthen their bond of relationship. Also, A short term medical course was fruitfully attended by 3 missionaries. Missionary Mohana Krishnan attended the training seminar on Apologetics arranged by RZIM ministries. Ministerial Efficiency Programme conducted

in Cuttack benefited two missionaries and 10 staff of Feed Orissa Project. Mr. Raju Kurne, Mr. Appalasamy and Mr. Leelan went for a month long concentrated training on driving the vehicles provided by Operation Mobilisation, in Lucknow. 34 selected missionaries were given a three day special training in Homiletics and 36 missionaries underwent an Advanced Leadership Training at National level offered by Haggai Institute in Sitteri Hills. 75 missionaries pursued missiological studies (B.Miss) through extension programme and completed 6 seminars. Besides these, different levels of training programmes were purposefully arranged in Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Orissa, Karnataka, Gujarat and Tamil Nadu in respective vernaculars, where the native workers were trained for missionary evangelism and character building.

Staff Welfare

Considering the staff as the real asset and their contribution in the furtherance of the gospel as priceless, BYM gives ample importance to the welfare and progress of each staff member, whether he or she is in the office or field.

Monthly allowances of the staff were paid in advance on the first day of each month. Though it was huge task in the eyes of a man, the good Lord provided needed help through the number of partners and sponsors who regularly support the missionaries by paying a minimum of Rs. 2000/- p.m. Besides these, thousands of donors contributed sacrificially, systematically and prayerfully towards the various needs of the missionaries and the field. Similarly 276 persons contributed regularly to sponsor the dependent kids of BYM to meet the basic and educational needs. The Lord enabled us to provide Christmas clothing allowance to the staff also, a family of four receiving Rs. 3,500/-. Regular appreciation gifts are being given to the staff for those who complete successful services for 5 years, 10 years, 20 years and 25 years. During this period 15 missionaries were honored for their 5 years of fulltime service with BYM and 5 missionaries for 10 years of service. The cash award of Rs. 1500/- and Rs. 3000/- were given respectively.

Coordination

While lengthening the mission activities, the need for strengthening the structure and system was kept in mind as top priority. The executive coordinators committee was convened quarterly for 3 days to self retrospect, pray and share matters of concern related to various areas of the mission work. All the coordinators of different Regions/States/Departments gathered for three days in December last and prepared the action plan for 2005, which was a rare gathering of *Pauls and Timothys*. The five Regional lady staff counselors monitored the work of the lady missionaries under the guidance of the Lady Staff coordinator. For an effective management, the entire administrative work load was shared among the Administrative Committee Members. The State Coordinators have been delegated with more responsibilities and provided with Associate State Coordinators who were ably directed and encouraged by the respective Regional Coordinators.

The General Overseer of the Mission, Mr. A. Lionel gave spiritual leadership and guidance at various levels. The Executive Chairman did not spare any stone unturned to build the staff and the team work and evolve a disciplined system. The important departments like finance, administration, mailing, HRD, Audit and Liaison were well coordinated from the National Headquarters at Vellore.

This thrilling eyewitness report shows how to listen to God, act in faith as a team and dare the impossible to fulfill His Great Commission. We give all glory to God who alone is worthy of all praises and glory! f

500 attended the revival programme in Koraput and an unusual crowd of 350 youth attended the Students Programme in Umerkote. More than 100 souls are getting ready to be baptised soon in Umerkote.

A church building each at the cost of Rs. 1,00,000/- is needed for Tobapadar and Toralakota of Koraput District; Balakumia, Athipari and Burusahi in the Soura Tribal belt and Pujaribarandi, Kopena, Kurumahandi,

We have started a hostel for the Soura tribal boys. We thank Mr. Israel Anandan, USA for sponsoring ten boys. They have hope of a bright future because of your help.

Struck Gold!

Just as God promised in Isaiah 45, He has given us the treasures of darkness and the hidden riches of secret places. During the course of our ministry in Mettur area, one of our partners Mr. Sampath informed us about Palamalai Hills which was fallow ground. We prayed for two years and then told Mr. Shanthakumar, General Secretary, BYM, who guided us to visit and survey the place. About 6000 people live in 32 villages up these hills

totally ignorant of Jesus Christ. Only a few villages are electrified. There is no road or bus-service. We have to climb the steep hills for 1½ hours. Government Staff posted there including teachers seldom go there due to this problem. For any medical help people have to climb down the hills and then travel 10 km in the plains to reach the small town Kolathur. Many die during delivery and some critically ill reportedly died on the way. We conducted two medical camps, one in June and one in July this year. As these people desperately needed medical help we focussed our attention on this need and opened the Blessing Health Centre. To start with, this project is planned for a year.

BEATIFIC BALAIS

A. Malarselvan

When Blessing Youth Mission started the ministry in Shrimadhapur Tahsil of Rajasthan in 1990, which consists of 187 villages with a population of 4,25,000 there were only five Christians—South Indians who had come there for employment. Of these people the Balais are an exploited and oppressed community. Missionaries withstood the unresponsiveness and spiritual dryness with prayer, faith, perseverance and sacrifice. Today 185 Balai believers worship the True God in 12 villages and towns.

Mrs. Mali is a strategic instrument God used, to bring many of her relatives to the Living God. The Makhans were terrified when stones and cow dung fell on them from nowhere. When they kneaded flour a blood like substance oozed out. Their daughter-in-law Kanchan experienced burning sensations all over her and one day her inner wear caught fire unexplainably. Newspapers published these bizarre happenings. They spent a huge sum on magicians. When nothing helped, they came to our missionaries and were wonderfully delivered. They were amazed at the power of our Lord. The entire family turned to the Lord. They are now non-stop witnessing folk for Jesus! Vijender, a 10th standard boy noticed a depressed boy in his class and understood that his brother was suffering from kidney stones. When Vijender shared about Jesus and prayed, he was healed. Vijender brought the family to our missionaries. They have become new creation and worship has been started in their village. Tarachand, a depressed youth found hope in the Words of Jesus. Today he is an important and effective leader in our church.

A fruitful tree receives stones. 20 young men entered our missionary's house in Srimadhapur and assaulted him and his wife. Such incidents are sporadically happening. We want to win the winnable while they are winnable. The following is our strategy.

1. Training Believers: We conduct Discipleship Training to equip the believers to win their own community to the Lord. Cost Rs.30,000/- year.

2. Leadership Development: Indigenous leadership is the key to church growth. We have taken 6 men and one woman this year. Our goal is to raise 100 lay leaders and 50 fulltimers. Monthly allowance for native evangelists is Rs. 1500/person. Training programme costs Rs.8000/year.

3. Worship cum Training Centres: Local People usually do not rent out their houses to Christian workers nor do they allow prayers to be conducted if they rent. The need of the hour is an 'Evangelism Centre' to cater to these and similar needs. One in Singhana and another in Srimadhapur (Rs. 6,00,000/- each).

We need a Worship Shed at Chirani village where the congregation is growing. Estimated cost of land and hall is Rs. 1,20,000/-. In Shrimadhapur

our missionaries have been asked to vacate the house. Worship service is conducted in the open garage where some hesitate to come. We need to erect a temporary shed costing Rs.25,000/-.

4. Community Development

A. Sewing Centres

Many of our believers are labourers. They struggle to establish themselves economically. If their wives are trained in sewing they can make both ends meet. The need is for two sewing centres each in Singhana and Neemkathana costing around Rs. 42,000/-.

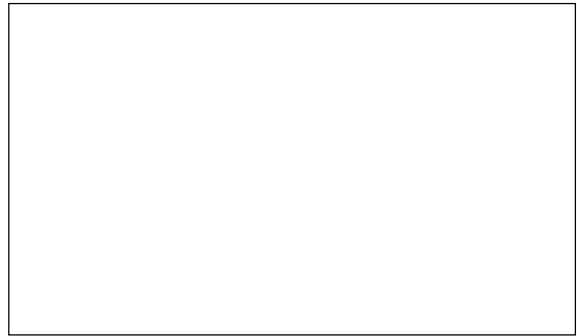
BLESSO 2005 IN MADHYA PRADESH

A revival meeting with outpouring of spiritual blessings was long awaited by the partners of Blessing Youth Mission in North India. **BLESSO 2005** held in Jabalpur, 10-12 October 2005 was the answer where the participants were drenched in the 'showers of blessing.' Some key partners and missionaries of Blessing Youth Mission came together to form the steering committee. Preparations started well in advance. Special prayers, fasting prayers and chain prayers in various stages were mobilized in different States, for a heaven sent revival.

Participants were from Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat, Rajasthan, Chattisgarh, Jharkhand, West Bengal, Meghalaya, Assam, Delhi and Madhya Pradesh. Some people repented and experienced the joy of salvation; many re-dedicated their lives for a God pleasing holy life; several people were anointed freshly and filled with the Holy Spirit; about 24 youngsters committed for the full time ministry and 26 for

part time ministry. The people listened to the balanced and healthy Biblical truths, which delivered and edified them. The rapturous worship brought all the participants to exalt the King of kings.

As participants were returning, they requested to organize such revival camps in various places as a regular feature. In short, Blesso 2005 was an experience of heaven on earth. MATERIAL HARVEST IN 2005!

(The Financial Report for the year 2004-2005)

Our hearts are filled with much gratitude unto the Lord of the Harvest and are humbled in His presence for bestowing upon us His choicest bounties of financial provisions all through the financial year, 2004-2005. He continued to be the 'Provider' to carry on the ministry that He has entrusted with us in the area of Revival and Missionary Evangelism during this year also. Join with us to lift up your voice and praise God for His faithfulness in the area of Finance as well!

With a spirit of Christian accountability towards God and men, duly acknowledging and appreciating the sacrifice involved in the liberal offerings of God's people, we thankfully present this Financial Report for the year. The total contribution of God's people was 365 million Indian Rupees (Rs. 3,64,55,149) which was just 5% more than the amount received during the previous year. Nearly 95% of the donations were received from our Indian partners and the rest from the Non-Indian well-wishers. Though the percentage of increase is marginal, it was sufficient to meet the expenditure of 321 million Indian Rupees (Rs.3,21,48,294/-), with an increased expenditure of 13% from the previous year. Our God is Jehovah-jireh! Hallelujah!

The major portion of our Receipts (69.9%) were for the missionary support and direct missionary work. Contribution for Relief and Social Welfare activities was around 11% and the rest, for other purposes. We thankfully acknowledge the labour of love put forth by our lay representatives who systematically visited the Christian friends in their respective places and mobilized prayer and financial support for God's ministry under the excellent guidance of Mr. J. Santhakumar, ACM for Mobilization & Sponsorship and Mr. A. Suthanthirasingh, the Tamilnadu Coordinator through Blessing Youth Mission. God is not unjust; He will not forget our labour (Heb 6:10).

We are happy to present here, that we have invested 89.88% of the funds received, for the objectives of the Mission, of which 57.24% towards Revival, Youth and Church Planting

ministries, 15.6% for the upliftment of the poor and the needy, 5.7% for the Assets, keeping the overhead administration expenditure to just 10.12% only.

Prudent planning and regulated expenditure under the dedicated leadership of our Coordinators are the hallmark reasons for this. The introduction of 'Tally' software beginning with April 2004 was an additional advantage. Mrs. Geetha Amalraj, the Associate Finance Coordinator and a good number of co-workers spent their valuable time to maintain the financial records.

To improve the efficiency in performance, the Finance Management of Literature Department was shifted to Blessing Literature Centre at Chennai, from the current Financial year. During 2004-2005, the amount received through Literature sales and donations for literature ministry was 3.11 million rupees, while the expenditure towards printing quality literature and production of audio and video tapes and CDs was 3.64 million rupees.

With the growth of the Mission, many of our senior missionaries are attaining retirement age and many young people are joining the Mission. To handle systematic training and welfare schemes of the staff, a Human Resources Development section was created in the headquarters office.

We appreciate the foresight of Bro. R. Stanley who handed over the responsibilities of this growing organization to the second line leaders with confidence. As you go through the annual ministerial reports and the periodical field news that appear in the monthly magazine, you will realize how amazingly the Lord is endorsing the ministry that continues in the principle of 'sowing the spiritual seed among the people and reaping a harvest of souls and material support' (1 Cor 9:11). To God be all the glory! Please intensify your efforts and continue your support so that the Mission will march ahead in its original vision: "Revival among youth and Evangelism through youth," in fulfilling the Great Commission of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ!






